The past year, 2020, was a difficult one for everyone in Milwaukee and especially for MTEF's participants, families, and staff.

None of us could have foreseen the challenges that would be presented by school closures/online education, job losses/income reduction, physical/mental health issues, limited social contact and other COVID-related issues.

I am proud to report, though, that MTEF continued to improve the lives and futures of our participants through tennis, education, and mentoring.

While our year-round programming had to be canceled in the spring, MTEF

was able to provide online social and educational programming to our year-round participants. Through incredible staff efforts under the leadership of then-Executive Director Julie Cordero, MTEF also safely and successfully delivered a modified summer program to a small but meaningful group.

Our organization actually was one of the few that managed to serve our community in-person. And our families commented on how important it was for MTEF to provide access to physical activity and social connections during a time of isolation and uncertainty.

Not only did MTEF survive 2020, we are thriving as an even stronger organization. Thanks to the continued generosity of our board members, individual donors and foundations, as well as timely government assistance, MTEF's balance sheet is the strongest in our almost 50-year history. This enabled us to expand our staff to include a part-time education director, Julia Mercado, who has revamped MTEF's educational curriculum and complemented our already talented team.

Additionally, MTEF has cemented a long-term partnership with Stryv365 and we have embedded their trauma-informed

programming into the core of all our offerings. This could not have come at a better time and demonstrates the power of partnerships to address areas of community need.

Finally, we have recruited several new talented and enthusiastic board members who will help MTEF make a greater difference in Milwaukee moving forward.

MTEF moves into 2021 with hopes for a return to some semblance of normal. As long as we can do so safely, we expect to resume our regular tennis and education programming for both year-round and summer participants.

We also look forward to once again holding our Serve and Connect event at Sherman Park on May 22, having our kids attend the Milwaukee Tennis Classic from Sept. 18-20 and hosting the 22nd MTEF Tennis Ball at the Italian Community Center on Nov. 6. It will be great to see many of you in person again!

In closing, I truly appreciate the support that you provide to MTEF's families. They need it and you all are better for it.

As Arthur Ashe, the founding father of NJTL organizations such as MTEF, said: "From what we get, we can make a living; what we give, however, makes a life."

# It Was an Exercise in Coping With COVID-19

The Milwaukee Tennis & Education Foundation is a Wisconsin 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation devoted to building the lives of at-risk youngsters one child at a time.

Founded in 1975 as a vehicle to preserve and promote the game of tennis in Wisconsin, the foundation primarily has focused its efforts on its central-city outreach and community tennis programs since 2002 when it absorbed the Milwaukee Community Tennis Association.

Although MTEF had offered outreach sessions involving tennis and education since 1995, it was not until 2001, when a \$31,000 grant from Miracle on Canal Street initiated the exponential growth TEAM has experienced since then.

MTEF is the Greater Milwaukee area's official National Junior Tennis and Learning (NJTL) chapter.

As of 2020, MTEF had received numerous national and regional awards for its programming, which emphasizes reading, life skills and nutrition/fitness in addition to tennis.

Among the honors, MTEF was rated, out of the then-more than 500, the No. 1 NJTL chapter in the country by the USTA in 2011 and the No. 2 in 2012.

It also is one of a handful organizations to continually receive the USTA's four-star rating, the highest an NJTL chapter can achieve.

That history contributed the grit and resiliency MTEF mustered to weather the COVID-19 pandemic that closed much of the nation down for most of 2020.

Several annual events were canceled starting with what would have been the second annual Serve & Connect Day, a daylong program that brings MTEF participants together with representatives of the Milwaukee Fire and Police Departments and community residents.

The annual MTEF TEAM Cup tournament and USTA Jr. Team Tennis were casualties of the pandemic as well. So was the 22nd Annual MTEF Tennis Ball.

But those few minuses fell far short of the many achievements MTEF managed during a difficult year.

Determined to focus on both the physical and social-





emotional wellbeing of its participants, the foundation provided more than 100 virtual classes that ran the gamut from traumainformed programs with Stryv365, cooking classes and even Spanish lessons. When and where possible, in-person tennis instruction proceeded, albeit with modifications that incorporated pandemic protocols, including mask-wearing and social distancing. In fact, MTEF was one of the first sports organizations to offer in-person activities in 2020.

MTEF also continued its summer partnerships with the Milwaukee Recreations Department, Brown Deer schools and the Brown Deer Parks and Recreation Department.

When asked to donate what they might have spent on the Tennis Ball, the foundation's largest fundraiser, former attendees came through in grand style, raising \$64,000.

In addition, an anonymous donation from a Brookfield couple allowed MTEF to offer scholarships, ranging from \$1,000 to \$5,000 to four MTEF participants.
