Kastenmaier, Navidad Are First Hentzen Scholarship Winners

he first recipients of the Herbert D. Hentzen, Jr. Scholarship have been chosen. They are Benjamin Kastenmeier and Daniel Navidad.

The scholarship was established in memory of Hentzen, who served on the board of directors from 2000 until his death in 2021. He was known for his love of tennis and his dedication to MTEF's mission. The scholarship is meant to honor his legacy and to recognize MTEF participants who embody his values.

The \$2,000 scholarship will be awarded annually to a TEAM participant who plans to major in STEM, business, or education. This year, there was a tie between two outstanding candidates, so each was rewarded.

Kastenmeier, a senior at Brown Deer High School, has been a part of MTEF since the age of 8. He plans a career in nursing. He has been a member of the boys' varsity tennis team, serving as captain in his junior season.

When speaking about his involvement with MTEF and tennis, Kastenmaier said, "I am aware of how lucky I am to be a part of MTEF. I am lucky to have access to indoor courts, coaching during the off season and good friends that I've met through the program."

One of the best parts of MTEF, he said, is the coaches.

"My coaches are huge role models to me," he said, "and I look up to every one of them."

Navidad, a senior at Ronald Reagan College Preparatory High School, joined MTEF in 2022. His career goals "are to be a part of a system that challenges the norm and uses technology/science."

When talking about his involvement with MTEF, Navidad said, "The culture in place within MTEF was one of support, passion, and hard work. Seeing other people work hard to improve instilled a work ethic that I believe pushes me to succeed in tennis."



Participating in MTEF activities, he said, also gives him time to forget any distractions he may be experiencing in his life.

"Whenever I step on the court, these issues become tuned out and I appreciate MTEF for giving me the opportunity to play the sport I love, improve my capabilities and connect me with a community of likeminded tennis enthusiasts."
